

Introduction

Child labour is one of the most heinous crimes prevailing in society. Child labour has existed for many centuries in various forms all over the world including India. However, there has been growing awareness about the ill effects of child labour in the last 30-40 years, leading to the emergence of an International legislative framework to combat this menace.

The Government of India have ratified two fundamental ILO Conventions concerning the elimination of child labour viz., the Minimum Age Convention, 1973 (No. 138) and the Worst Forms of Child Labour Convention, 1999 (No. 182).

A series of measures in this regard, including the amendment to the Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986, came into effect on 1st September 2016. This amendment now completely prohibits the employment or work of children below 14 years in any occupation or process and also prohibits the employment of adolescents (14 to 18 years) in hazardous occupations and processes.

The Status of Child Labour in Tamil Nadu


The Government of Tamil Nadu has been at the forefront of the fight against the evils of child labour by taking a proactive stand on the eradication of child labour by initiating measures to tackle the problem of child labour systematically and effectively. The Government has adopted a multipronged strategy which includes both stringent legislation and project based approaches. The concerted efforts taken by the State Government have resulted in perceptible decline in the number of child labourers in the State.

Due to effective enforcement, rescue and rehabilitative measures taken by the Government, the number of child workers has reduced to 1.51 lakh in the 2011 census as against 4.19 lakh in the 2001 census. The number of child labourers has steadily reduced over the period due to various enforcement, rehabilitation and developmental efforts taken by the Government.



Samagra Shiksha Survey

The survey conducted by Samagra Shiksha (SS), Tamil Nadu has placed the number of out of school children with earning compulsion as indicated below:-



The Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986

The Government of India introduced new amendments with effect from 01.09.2016 and the key features are as under:-

- The Child Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act, 1986 substituted by The child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act, 1986.
- "Adolescent" means a person who has completed his fourteenth year of age but has not completed his eighteenth year.
- No children below 14 years shall be employed or permitted to work in any occupation or process.
- No adolescent shall be employed or permitted to work in any of the hazardous occupations set forth in the Schedule.
- Special exemption given to child artist, singer and sports person to exhibit their talents.
- Imprisonment for a term which shall not be less than six months may extend to two years or with fine not less than Rs.20,000/- may extend to Rs.50,000/- or with both.
- Parent or guardian having been convicted of an offence for engaging children for work, commits a like offence afterwards, he shall be punishable with a fine which may extend to ten thousand rupees.

Initiatives

The State Action Plan

To implement the Act more effectively, the Government of Tamil Nadu rolled out a State Action Plan (SAP) for eradication of Child and Adolescent Labour vide G.O. (Ms) No.8, Labour and Employment (U2) Department, dated 30/01/2019. The State Action Plan is aimed at providing guidelines to the enforcement officials and the role of the other line departments and suggests implementation measures which will result in the elimination of Child and Adolescent Labour in the State.

The Key strategies of the State Action Plan are:-

- Identification of children and adolescents engaged in employment
- Enforcement of labour laws prohibiting child and adolescent labour
- Economic rehabilitation
- Awareness generation
- Recognition for child labour elimination and celebration of success
- Involving employers
- Community participation
- > Training
- Convergence of services

The Vision of the Action Plan

Child Labour will be completely eliminated in all employments by ensuring universal elementary education and Adolescent Labour will be eliminated in all hazardous occupations and processes by the year 2025.

Standard Operating Procedures

Effective enforcement and implementation of the provisions of the various legislation, convergence of resources of the Government, both horizontally and vertically, coordination between various stakeholders and active involvement of the community are the keys to attaining the ambitious goal of a child labour free society. It has been observed that despite the presence of a plethora of protective legislation, the stakeholders are not very clear about the action to be taken when child or adolescent labour is identified. Specific information is required on steps to be taken to the rescue of the child or adolescent and subsequent rehabilitative measures to be taken. Hence, a Standard Operating Procedure has been approved by the Government vide G.O. (Ms) No.58, Labour and Employment (U2) Department, dated 28/05/2019.

State Rules

For smooth and effective implementation of the Act, the Government of Tamil Nadu has initiated action by amending State Rules vide G.O.(Ms) No. 220, Labour and Employment (U2) Department, Dated. 15/11/19.

The salient features of the amended rules are as follows:

- 2A. Awareness on prohibition of employment of child and adolescents in contravention of the Act
- 2B. Child to help his family without affecting education
- 2C. Child to work as an artist
- 2D. Hours of work
- 2E. Payment of amount to child or adolescent from and out of Child and

 Adolescent Labour Rehabilitation Fund
- 3. Certificate of age
- 3A. Persons who may file complaint
- 3B. Manner of compounding offences
- 3C. Duties of District Magistrate
- 3D. Duties of Inspectors
- 3E. Periodical inspection and monitoring

PENCIL Portal (Platform for Effective Enforcement for No Child Labour)

To ensure complete prohibition of employment of children below 14 years, the Government of India has introduced a vibrant enforcement mechanism in the form of an online portal "PENCiL" (Platform for Effective Enforcement for No Child Labour) www.pencil.gov.in.



CHILDLINE 1098

CHILDLINE 1098 is a phone number that spells hope for millions of children across India. It is a 24-hour a day, 365 days a year, free emergency phone service for children in need of aid and assistance. CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) is the nodal agency of the Union Ministry of Women and Child Development for setting up, managing and monitoring the CHILDLINE 1098 service all over the country.



Enforcement

Enforcement plays a vital role in the various activities initiated for the eradication of child labour. The Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986 and the Allied Acts prohibiting the employment of Children are implemented in the State by the Assistant Commissioners of Labour and Deputy Directors of Industrial Safety and Health.

- 1. The Factories Act, 1948
- 2. The Motor Transport Workers Act, 1961
- 3. The Beedi and Cigar Workers (Conditions of Employment) Act, 1966
- 4. The Tamil Nadu Shops and Establishments Act, 1947
- 5. The Tamil Nadu Catering Establishments Act, 1958
- 6. The Plantations Labour Act, 1951
- The State has notified the Assistant Commissioners of Labour (Enforcement) as Nodal Officers for each district.
- A District Level Task Force chaired by the District Collector has been functioning in all the Districts of the State since November 2007. The District Level Task Force was reconstituted vide G.O. (2D) No.2, Labour and Employment (U2) Department dated 11.01.2021. The District Level Task Force comprising of District Collector as Chairman, Superintendent of Police, Joint Director of Industrial Safety and Health, Joint Commissioner of Labour, Additional District Magistrate, representative of the District Legal Services Authority, Chief Educational Officer and NGO representatives is responsible for organizing special raids and rescuing and rehabilitating child labour and adolescent labour employed in hazardous and non- hazardous occupations and processes, apart from initiating legal action against the erring employers.

- Apart from the raids conducted by the District level Task force, regular inspections are carried out by the Assistant Commissioners of Labour (Enforcement) and Deputy Directors of Industrial Safety and Health.



- State Award is being given to Assistant Commissioner of Labour (Enforcement) and Deputy Director of Industrial Safety and Health for their best work in eradication of child labour.




National Child Labour Project

- Enforcement Officers of the Commissioner of Labour along with DISH officials enforce the Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act, 1986 and the corresponding rehabilitation of the rescued child labourers through the National Child Labour Project and Samagra Shiksha.
- ❖ The Government of India is implementing the National Child Labour Project (NCLP) Scheme since 1988 for the rehabilitation of rescued children. The rescued child labourers are put into NCLP Special Training Centres where bridge education, vocational training, mid-day meal, stipend, health care and recreation etc. is provided with the ultimate objective of preparing them to be mainstreamed into the formal system of education.
- National Child Labour Project Scheme is a fully funded Government of India Scheme where 100% of the funding is granted by the Ministry of Labour and Employment directly to the registered NCLP District Project Society functioning under the Chairmanship of the District Collector.



- In Tamil Nadu, 15 NCLP Projects functioned upto 31.03.2021. The Government of India subsumed 12 NCLPs under Samagra Shiksha and allowed 3 NCLP districts, viz., Dharmapuri, Krishnagiri and Vellore to function upto 31.3.2023, in which 30 STCs were functioning and 519 children were studying.
- ❖ So far 1,20,192 children have been mainstreamed into regular schools since the inception of the project. The Government of India provides a stipend of Rs.400/- per month for children studying in STCs.
- The Government of Tamil Nadu also provides Rs.500/- per month as educational assistance to those children who have completed their school studies and are pursuing higher education (Degree or Diploma) for the full term of their course. During the Financial Year 2021-22, 345 children benefited to the tune of Rs.20.70 lakh.



The Government of Tamil Nadu is also providing an additional honorarium at the rate Rs.500/- per month to NCLP Staff and educational instructors. During the year 2021-22, 714 staff and instructors benefited to the tune of Rs.41.23 lakh.

Benefits provided by the State Government

Mid-day Meal

Mid-day Meal is provided to all NCLP special training centre children by Social Welfare and Nutritious Meal Programme Department with effect from January 2011. During the Covid -19 pandemic period, dry ration was provided to the STC children through District noon Meal Programme.



Health Check up

The children of the special training centre of the NCLP are ensured with regular health check-ups. In Tamil Nadu, health check-ups are being carried out periodically for all the children of the NCLP special training centres by the State Health Department. Health cards are maintained for all special training centre children.

Due to the initiative of the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, online educational training classes to Special Training Centre children were conducted by Kalvi Television Channel.

An order from the Labour Commissioner Atul Anand read, all students studying under National Child Labour Project are to attend these special classes broadcasted in the said time. The project directors and volunteers are to ensure that the students attend these

classes without fail. The volunteers have been sought to inform the students, who have a television at their houses, to watch the classes and for those who do not have a television, arrangements are to be made at the volunteers' houses or other students' houses.

NCLP Project Director Narayanaswamy said students of 16 specialised training centres, operating under the Virudhunagar District National Child Labor Project, are watching the televised classes on Kalvi TV.

Special Initiatives

'No Child Labour' Sticker on fire cracker, beedi products

As an initiative taken by the Government of Tamil Nadu the fire cracker industry and beedi making industry put a 'No Child Labour' Sticker on their products as a mark of their commitment for making Tamil Nadu a child labour Free State.

Government Contribution to the Rescued Child Labourers

As per the Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act 1986, an amount of Rs.20,000/- to 50,000/- was imposed as fine on the erring employer by the court. The Government of Tamil Nadu is giving an amount of Rs.15,000/- as Government contribution to the rescued child labour or adolescent labour in hazardous occupations. The amount along with court fine is deposited in the bank as fixed deposit in the name of the rescued child or adolescent labour. On attainment of 18 years of age, the amount is given to the children or adolescents. So far an amount of Rs.2,40,000/- has been given to 16 child labourers as a Government contribution by the Government.





From Weaving to Healing the sick!

Ramalingam's inspiring story of endurance and determination is a source of great inspiration to all who hear it. Faced with mounting debts when their fields were sold, Ramalingam and his siblings dropped out of school and worked in a power loom unit. He was identified by the project staff and offered a way back into school. On mainstreaming into regular school, he scored over 97 percent in his XII Board Exams and thus qualified himself for a "free seat" in a Government Medical College. Today, he is working in Trichy Government Medical College.



You cannot box her in!

When Rajeswari's family fell on hard times, she took up matchbox making to augment her parent's income. Two years later, the Special Training Centre instructor found her and convinced her mother to let her enroll at the STC. Rajeswari successfully completed the teacher-training programme at the District Institute of Education and Training and began teaching at a Special Training Centre. She joined a Government School as a teacher and worked her way up to becoming a Headmistress. She is now working in Thondi Government Higher Secondary School in Ramnad District. A role model for child workers, girls in particular, she wants them to know that they too can overcome any odds.



A New Lease of Life!

Moorthy, a class V student, was forced to leave school and join his mother, a daily wage construction worker, to make out a living. His dream of a good education came crashing down upon him without warning. Fortunately for Moorthy, he was identified by the STC instructors and given a glimmer of hope when they took him to the Centre where he spent 18 months. Following this, Moorthy was mainstreamed into a regular Government School where he excelled in his studies and went on to score a remarkable 93.6 percent in the XII Board Examinations. The state Government also encouraged him in his medical endeavors by extending a monthly stipend for the entire course. Today, Moorthy has been selected for MD in pediatrician course at CMC, Vellore. Dr. Moorthy had finally realised his dream.

From brick kiln to grad, Irular man beats all odds

EVEN at the tender age of seven, D Sivakumar's hands were used to hard labour, toiling all day in a brick kiln at a village located in the Tamil-Nadu and Karnataka border. Now, almost 22 years later, donning yellow graduation robes, the Irular man gripped onto a degree certificate, as he walked down from the stage of Madras Christian College (MCC).

The 29-year-old rescued brick kiln child labourer had never imagined he would ever be able to go to school, let alone secure 63% in his newly-earned master's degree in social work (MSW).

Overcoming all the hurdles

in life, Sivakumar is today a role model for his community. "This is not just a degree but it is the outcome of all the pain I had to undergo, my perseverance and all the hardships I faced to reach so far," explained Sivakumar.

Life was far from easy for Sivakumar, a native of Karagoor village in Dharmapuri. Born into an economically backward Irular family, he was forced to work at a brick kiln with his uncle after his father, a dailywage labourer. The boy also had to bear the brunt of the abuse, and torture from the supervisors at the kiln.

"My life was hell until an NGO rescued me and brought me back home at 10 years old,

in 2003," said Sivakumar. Due to paucity of money, he again started doing petty jobs and later with the help of volunteers, he joined the National Child Labour Project (NCLP) school and resumed his studies. At 19, Sivakumar cleared his Class 10 through a correspondence course and, at 21 years, he enrolled in Class 11.

"I was determined to study despite all hardships. I know education is the only way through which I can make a difference for my community. My only goal in pursuing a master's was to gain more knowledge in the field of social work so that I can help my people. Due to poverty, Irular children are forced to work as labourers while girls become the victims to child marriages. I want to put an end to all of this," explains Sivakumar.

Meanwhile, MCC principal Paul Wilson said the college has been continuously supporting students from tribal communities and working for their welfare by providing them admission to the college.

RESCUED BY NGO IN 2003

"My life was hell until an NGO rescued me and brought me back home at 10 years old, in 2003," said Sivakumar. Due to paucity of money, he again started doing petty jobs and later with the help of volunteers, he joined the NCLP school and resumed his studies.

High Level Monitoring Committees on Eradication of Child Labour

The State Authority on the Elimination of Child Labour meeting and the State Level Monitoring Committee meeting for NCLP were held on 25.07.2022 under the Chairmanship of the Chief Secretary to Government for effective implementation of the Act.



Plan of Action

- ❖ State level consortium to be filled with CII, ASSOCHAM, NASCOMM,CREDAI, NGOs and other bodies to ensure zero child labour in the State by 2025.
- Regularly engage Anna Administrative Staff College to conduct training / capacity building for labour officials and include child and adolescent labour act curriculum in the annual training calendar.
- ❖ State level memorandum of understanding with research institutions / universities to conduct survey on child labour.
- Inter departmental collaboration to ensure issues of child labour are well publicized / sensitized.
- ❖ To take up massive awareness generation programs through community participation and by effectively organizing IEC activities.

- 3. The revised State Action Plan for Child Labour sent by the Commissioner of Labour contains the salient features of the amended Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986, National Child Labour Project, Release and Rescue process, Enforcement of Labour Laws, Awareness Generation, Skill Development Training, Implementation of State Action Plan, Economic Rehabilitation, Community Participation, Monitoring Mechanism, Mainstreaming Child Labour and Convergence of Services of the concerned departments etc.,. The above said actions are interrelated with line departments of Revenue, Municipal Administration and Water Supply, Social Defence, Home (Police), Health, Adi Dravidar and Tribal Welfare, Rural Development and School Education, etc.
- 4. The Government after careful consideration approve the "State Action Plan for Eradication of Child Labour and Eradication of Adolescent Labour in Hazardous Occupations and Processes as in the annexures.
- 5. The Departments noted in the address entry are instructed to implement the State Action Plan for Eradication of Child Labour and Eradication of Adolescent Labour in Hazardous Occupations and Processes immediately and extend the fullest co-operation to the District Collectors and the Commissioner of Labour for the successful implementation of the Action Plan. The District Collectors, who play a vital role in achieving convergence of services of all Governmental and Non-Governmental agencies are requested to eectively implement the Action Plan.
- 6. Progress of implementation of the Action Plan shall be monitored by the Commissioner of Labour and a report sent to Government by $10^{\rm th}$ of every month.

- 3. In the letters 3rd read above, the Commissioner of Labour has sent a draft Standard Operating Procedure(SOP) to the Government and has also sent the said draft Standard Operating Procedure(SOP) to the line departments requesting them to offer their valuable suggestions / inputs, if any for effective eradication of Child Labour, since it is reveal that the Standard Operating Procedure has connection with many line departments, that is Rural Development and Panchayat Raj, Social Welfare and Nutritious Meal Programme, School Education, Public Works, Highways and Minor Ports, Home (Police), Health and Family Welfare, Municipal Administration and Water Supply, Information and Public Relations, Revenue, Adi Dravidar and Tribal Welfare, Backward Classes, Most Backward Classes and Minorities Welfare Departments and Tamil Nadu State Commission for Protection of Child Rights etc., to the Government for approval.
- 4. The Government have examined the proposal of Commissioner of Labour carefully and approve the Standard Operating Procedure for effective enforcement of the

Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986, annexed to this Government Order.

- 5. The Standard Operating Procedure will be followed by the concerned officials with fullest co-operation to the Collectors and Commissioner of Labour for successful implementation of the Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act 1986 and it will promote the implementation of uniform procedure and to ensure the clarification of understanding on the subject with the basic objective of assisting to the District Collectors and their team to achieve the goal of eradication of Child Labour System in our State.

In the letter 3rd read above, the Commissioner of Labour has stated that the Child Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act, 1986 was amended as the Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act, came into effect from 01.09.2016. Accordingly, the Government of Tamil Nadu has made an amendments to the Tamil Nadu Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Rules, 1994 in the Government Order 2nd read above, in which under Rule 3C (i) of (iii) (Duties of District Magistrate) it was prescribed that the District Task Force to be formed in the Districts consisting of following members:-
 - a) Inspector appointed under Section 17 for the purposes of his local limits of jurisdiction.
 - b) Superintendent of Police for the purposes of his local limits of jurisdiction.
 - Additional District Magistrate for the purposes of his local limits of jurisdiction.

- d) District Nodal Officer referred to under clause (i) for the purposes of his local limits of jurisdiction.
- e) Two representatives each from a voluntary organization involved in rescue and rehabilitation of employed children in the district on rotation basis for a period of two years.
- f) A representative of the District Legal Services Authority to be nominated by the District Judge.
- g) A member of the District Anti-trafficking unit.
- h) Chairperson of the Child Welfare Committee of the District.
- i) District Child Protection Officer.
- 1) District Education Officer.
- k) Any other person nominated by the District Magistrate.
- 1) Chief Medical Officer.
- m) Secretary of the Task Force shall be any of the nodal officers referred to in clause (i) and nominated by chairperson.

The Task Force referred in clause (iii) should meet at least once in every month, make a comprehensive action plan for conducting the rescue operation, point of raid in accordance with the law for the time being in force, confidentiality of the plan, protection of victims and witnesses and the interim relief, in accordance with the guidelines for rescue and repatriation issued by the State Government from time to time.

3. The Commissioner of Labour has further stated that as prescribed in the Tamil Nadu Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Amendment Rules, 1994 under Rule 3C (i) of (iii), a District Task Force to be formed in the Districts consisting of following members:-
